If you remember I also had mentioned that upon close inspection of my '90 300ZXTT that the rear tires were quite worn on the inside. This is in fact quite common in these cars as they have a negative camber that helps with the handling. Anyway, I was hoping to hold off buying a new set until next spring. It is already August and the summer is winding down ever so slowly so to buy a set and use it for a few months just to store the Z for the winter made no sense. I was not seeing any cords yet so I thought I could get another 1000miles on it easy. Well, I could not get it off my mind. I am driving on tires that are 13 yrs old, with over 26k miles on them, and noisy. I don't want to have a problem. Alright Ty, just bite the bullet and buy the tires. I really like the Bridgestone's I had just bought from Tire Rack plus I have had good luck with this brand in the past so I went to the Tire Rack website to check on some prices. I plugged in my Z's info and the fact that it was a Turbo and clicked enter. That's weird. I only got 7 choices of tires, 6 of which were track/competition tires. I must have made a mistake. I tried it again and same thing. What is going on here? The "Tire Rack", the tire supplier of tire suppliers has only 1 road tire for my 1990 Z? How can that be? I know the Z is 21 years old but come on!! And the only street tire brand they had is called "Fusion"? What the h--- is a Fusion? I decided to call them. Same story. It appears that the rear tire size (245 45-16) is not that "popular" anymore and manufacturers are no longer making that size. The fronts are not a problem, just the rears. Are you sure you don't have any sitting in the back somewhere? They were sure. Well, I decided to call around to Discount Tire, NTB, even Sears without any luck. I even tried local non chain stores as well as Nissan and

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got the same answer. My 1990 300ZXTT is now obsolete. I was in a state of panic. How can I drive my Z anymore? It has ancient bald tires that could blow any minute, even while parked. Should I buy the Fusions even though I don't know a thing about them? What if Tire Rack runs out of those before I come to a decision? What do I do then? I called Tire Rack again to inquire about this Fusion brand. Turns out they are a lower level brand of Bridgestone that is cheaper in cost but apparently a good tire. I read the reviews about the tire and finally ordered a set of 4. I felt like I was stuck buying them but really had no other choice. My Z will be sporting Fusions.

The tires came and they looked OK. The treadwear was 360 and the temperature and traction were rated A so how bad could that be? So I put 2 of them in the passenger seat and 2 in the rear compartment and went to have them mounted and Road Force Balanced. As I drove the Z home, I immediately noticed the quietness compared to the old tires. The tires did balance quite well but they did feel a little squirrelly. That might be because they have a decent amount of tread on them. I haven't really pushed them yet since they are new but so far so good. Time will tell.

So you think that is the end of my saga? Not quite. 3 days later I was going to take the 300 to work. As I was putting my briefcase into the rear hatch I noted a something odd. My Z seemed as if it was leaning a little to the left. That's weird. Did I run up on top of one the kids shoes or something? Then I saw it. What da!!! I had a flat tire. The left rear tire was as flat as could be. I couldn't believe it. I was pissed. Was it the Fusion? I knew I should not have bought those tires. Was it the valve stem? I did not have the time to

deal with it so I took my E55, the one with the new Bridgestone tires. That night I took the tire off and there it was: a huge bolt sitting at the edge of the outside tread. It barely had 100miles on it and the tire was toast. Where in the world did I pick this up from? There was no way they could repair this. Great! Now what? I only had one option. I called Tire Rack and ordered another Fusion. What a waste of money. So back to the store to have the tire mounted. Then back onto the 300. What a hassle. You know what the funny thing is? Way back in 1998, April 22nd to be exact, was when I had last purchased a set of tires for this car. On May 2nd of that same year, with only 60miles on the new tires, I did get a flat tire due to a nail. Wow! What a coincidence. That time though they were able to fix it. Moral of the story: Don't buy new tires..... ~ Tu Z ya




