The driving season is fast approaching.

For those of you who want to get a little more of a performance experience from your car, there are safe ways to explore the limits. After all, we don't want to see you wrapped around a telephone pole. There are organizations dedicated to teaching enthusiasts about performance driving, and providing a safe environment to do so. There are classes if you want to drive on a race track, or if you want to start in a parking lot for an autocross event. The 800 lb – gorilla in this area is the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA). A lesser known Midwest organization is the Midwest Council of Sports Car Clubs (MCSCC). There are a number of local clubs that are jointly the basis for this organization. These clubs host and sponsor drivers schools, low speed (Solo II) autocrosses, high speed (Solo I) autocrosses and wheel-to-wheel racing all under the sanctioning of the MCSCC.

If you have never done this before, but you have some interest in learning, a good starting point is the low speed autocross. Generally, this is a course set up in a parking lot using orange road cones. Similar cars are classed together and run individually and timed through the course of cones. It requires a lot of coordination and driving skill to string together a fast series of shifts and turns to make it through the course quickly, without knocking any of the cones out of position. Speeds are relatively low, but seem a whole lot faster. All that is required is a safe roadworthy car and a helmet. Skills learned are applicable to car control in emergency situations on the road, and would also serve you in good stead should you ever want to move up to the higher speed track events.

A number of the Z club members belong to Salt Creek Sports Car Club (SCSCC) which is a member club of MCSCC. If you are interested, feel free to contact me, or go to their website – www.scscc.net for

more information on the club and their events. You can come out and watch and ask questions if you want to know more. They are also happy to provide instruction for any newcomers. Most of the low speed autocrosses this year will be held in a parking lot at Maywood race track on North Avenue in the suburb of Maywood. This year's current schedule for the low speed autocrosses is a follows:

6/16/07	The Tire Rack (South Bend, Indiana)

We are planning on targeting the 7/29 date to be a Z Club event. More details on this are forthcoming.

**Guest column:** What to drive next.

At one time I owned five Z-cars simultaneously. Naturally, I couldn't drive them all at once and in fact, my son and daughter drove two of them. I used to go the Z General Meetings and relished the "introductions" at the start. Each member stated their name and what car (or cars) they drove. I felt badly for those who proudly exclaimed that they owned three Z-cars. When it was my turn there were a few people who said "oh" or "ah" when I proudly listed my possessions. The three car people looked a little disappointed. Currently, I am custodian of three of our favorite Nissan model.

It's strange how some of us become attached to vehicles particularly if they are special. Z-cars are special. They give us good feelings when we drive them. They make us proud. When I drive my Z, I feel like I'm in the very best car on the road. No Mercedes or BMW is superior to my car. Those cars are massproduced. My car is a classic. There is no feeling like it in the world. There are other satisfying feelings and some may be better than the "on the road in my Z" feeling. But there is none like it.

Last night I picked up an extra job. I hired on with a company to drive the cars from the floor of the Chicago Auto Show to the 31<sup>st</sup> Street parking lot. We walked through the Porsche exhibit checking out the sticks that comes out of the consol. The prohibitively expensive cars were out of the question. The South Hall was next. A trip to the Nissan display was mandatory. Having been there six days earlier, I knew what to expect. There were four 350Zs there. Two were roadsters and two were coupes. The brilliant red roadster at the front of the exhibit was a stick shift car. Yes! There is always hope.

At the Chrysler booth they had "interactive"

exhibits. If you stood in line long enough, you could experience the traction control available on their products. A slalom, braking and acceleration on ice were available to test this feature.

We wandered through the rest of the show until the appointed meeting time approached. The meeting place was behind the GMC truck display. It was there

that we learned the dastardly truth about our upcoming assignments. The company we were working for had the contract to move only the GM and Hyundai autos. No Porsche of me. But maybe I could score a Corvette.

Once the vehicles were disconnected from their power cords and inverters (the batteries, of course

would not stand up to ten days of "tire kickers" indiscriminately throwing switches), we began the big move. My first vehicle was a rather nondescript midsized sedan. I think it was a Malibu. The automobile could be transformed from a necessity into a recreational



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


